Parking Process

The church does not own the Market Square Garage but we pay for worship service parking. You will receive the first of two exit tickets when you press the button to enter the garage. Please do not misplace that first ticket; if you do, the garage will charge you a \$32 lost ticket fee which is your responsibility to pay. In order to exit the garage at

no cost to you, you must obtain a second ticket with the number 2 written on it. At the exit machine, wait until the gate comes down, then insert the ticket you received when entering the garage, bar code facing up. When the machine



asks for payment, insert the ticket you received from the church, bar code up. If you have any kind of problem, press the telephone icon on the exit gate machine and tell the call center representative that you are at the Market Square Garage and your validated exit ticket is not working. Children's Ministry

Children of all ages are always welcome! There are two shelves in our Narthex (at the back of the Sanctuary) with sequin boards, crayons, markers, coloring sheets, and puzzles as well as a few library books that go along with the theme of the worship service. On typical Sundays immediately following the children's sermon (around 11:15 a.m.), education for children K-6 is offered in the Children's Education Room (Level 4). On Sundays, nursery care is available for children (infants through 5-year-olds) in the nursery on the fourth floor. The nursery is staffed by Sidney Dame, our nursery caregiver, and volunteers.

We are glad you joined us for worship today! Please take a moment to sign the yellow visitor card located in your pew and place it in the offering plate or hand to an usher. 





Communion Banner

Liturgical colors help orient us to the seasons of the church year and invite us to engage worship with our sense of sight. Green, used during Ordinary Time and seen here in the Communion banner behind the pulpit, symbolizes growth in faith as we follow Christ through scripture, preaching, and song. It also reflects our hope in the promise of eternal life.

Description of the Banner Symbols:

- The wheat stalk represents the bread of Communion, recalling Christ as the Bread of Life.
- The **cluster of grapes** points to the juice of Communion, a reminder of Christ's blood poured out in the new covenant.
- The large Chi-Rho —formed by overlapping the first two letters of the Greek word *Christos*—is one of the earliest Christian symbols, proclaiming Christ as Lord.

Together, these images center us on the meaning of the Lord's Supper: Christ's life given for the world, sustaining us in faith and pointing us to eternal hope.

In celebration of World Communion Day, the atrium is adorned with flags representing nations from around the world.

Today! Peace & Global Witness Offering

This morning, we will join Christians worldwide in celebrating World Communion Sunday and dedicating the Peace & Global Witness Offering, which strengthens peacemaking efforts locally, regionally, and globally.

- 50% supports worldwide peacemaking through the Presbyterian Mission Agency.
- **25%** goes to the **Presbytery of Carlisle** to assist local helping agencies.
- **25%** remains with **our congregation** for local ministry.

This year, on the recommendation of the Peacemaking Committee, our Faith and Justice Committee has designated our local share for the **International Service Center (ISC)**, which is housed in our church.

The ISC is under significant strain, having recently laid off 16 staff members due to funding shortfalls caused by new Executive Orders targeting refugees and asylum-seekers. Dr. Phuong, ISC's director, is seeking resources to restore these positions and has asked for our prayers. Your gifts will directly sustain this vital ministry, which provides critical support to vulnerable neighbors seeking refuge and safety.

Harrisburg Palestine Coalition: Five-Day Vigil

The Harrisburg Palestine Coalition will host a five-day vigil to honor and remember the lives of Palestinians lost in the war in Gaza.

Each day will include a "Reading of the Names"—volunteers will read the names of more than 60,000 documented victims, including over 18,000 children.

The coalition describes the vigil as an act of communal mourning, a show of solidarity with survivors, and a call for an immediate end to the violence, genocide, and occupation of Palestine.

Music Notes This Week

The spiritual, "Kumbaya" (Come by Here), has long been a prayerful song of comfort and hope, calling on God to be present in times of need, joy, and sorrow. John Behnke captures the gentle spirit of this tune in his "Variations on 'Kumbaya." Each variation highlights a different facet of the melody, moving from tender simplicity to lively rhythmic energy, while keeping the prayerful character of the song at its core. Through these imaginative settings, the familiar tune is both refreshed and deepened, inviting listeners to hear anew the heartfelt plea: "Come by here, Lord."

Originating in South Africa, the isiZulu hymn "Akekho ofana no Jesu" proclaims joyfully, "There is no one like Jesus." Sung and loved across the world, the hymn is marked by its rhythmic vitality and heartfelt repetition, drawing singers and listeners into a spirit of communal praise. South African composer Charlotte Botha has arranged this hymn with fresh harmonies and lively textures, allowing the music's energy and joy to shine through while honoring its roots. This arrangement invites us to join in the global song of faith, celebrating the uniqueness of Christ and the unifying power of music across cultures.

We joyfully process in this morning singing the energetic hymn, "We Are Marching in the Light of God!" Originating in South Africa, this hymn is a joyful witness and steadfast faith! Its words, simple and powerful, affirm that we walk, sing, and live in the light of God's presence. Emerging during a time of struggle, the song became both a spiritual anthem and a call for justice, uniting communities in hope and courage. Sung around the world today, its infectious rhythm and repeating phrases invite everyone to join in, embodying the joy of faith and the strength of God's light leading us forward.

Our responsive hymn, "O Jesus, I have Promised," was written in 1869 by John Ernest Bode for his children's confirmation. It is a hymn of lifelong discipleship and devotion. Its words are both a prayer and a pledge, expressing the desire to follow Christ faithfully and to lean on His strength in every stage of life. The text is most often paired with the gentle and lyrical tune ANGEL'S STORY, composed in 1861 by Arthur H. Mann. Together, the hymn's earnest poetry and flowing melody create a heartfelt affirmation of faith, reminding us that the Christian journey is one of daily commitment and trust in Christ's guiding presence.

Orlando Gibbons was one of England's greatest Renaissance composers, serving as organist at the Chapel Royal and Westminster Abbey. His anthem "O Lord, Increase Our Faith" is a short but profound prayer for strength and trust in God. Though written over 400 years ago, its text and music still speak with timeless relevance, offering a simple yet heartfelt petition: that our faith may be deepened and sustained by God's grace.

Our sending hymn, "May the God of Hope Go with Us," is a modern benediction text by Alvin Schutmaat, a missionary and educator who served in Latin America. Its words send God's people out into the world with joy, peace, and courage, reminding us that the Spirit equips us for lives of service and witness. The text is paired with the lively folk tune, ARGENTINA, a melody rooted in the rhythms and dance-like character of South American music. The energetic syncopations and lilting motion reflect the vibrancy of Latin American worship, where faith is often celebrated with movement, rhythm, and song.

British composer, pianist, and organist Iain Farrington, is known for his imaginative writing that bridges classical tradition with contemporary vitality. "Voices of the World" is a striking piece that explores the power and presence of God's Word through music. Using rhythmic energy, colorful harmonies, and varied textures, Farrington gives the impression of many voices speaking, singing, and proclaiming together. At times bold and declamatory, and times gentle and lyrical, the piece captures both the strength and the intimacy of God's Word as it resounds in the life of the Church.

Music next week – The Sanctuary Choir will sing "Heal Us Now" by Leon Sher and "Walk Humbly with Your God" by Fred Gramann. The hymns for the morning will be, "When the Morning Stars Together," "Silence! Frenzied, Uncleaned Spirit," and "God Whose Giving Knows No Ending."



Beacon Society Educational Session

In 2016, Market Square created a charter list of members who included the church in their estate plans. This became known as the **Beacon Society**.

MSPC is blessed with a strong endowment that enables us to sustain a vibrant congregational ministry, extend our mission outreach, and care for our beautiful but aging building. Thanks to this support, nearly 47% of our annual budget comes from bequests made by members in their wills and estates, as well as proceeds from the 1988 sale of our radio station, WMSP. These resources allow us to maintain an unusually robust ministry in an urban setting, far beyond what annual contributions alone could provide.

Our endowment will remain essential to the life and vitality of Market Square. It sustains the preaching, music, and educational ministries that nurture our faith; strengthens our commitment to justice, equality, and peace; and provides a gathering place not only for our congregation but also for many community groups.

The **Beacon Society** is made up of members and friends who have named Market Square in their wills or estate plans. The purpose is not to know the size of the gift, but simply to acknowledge the intention. By joining, members ensure their presence and witness will continue as part of the Market Square family and the Communion of Saints for generations to come. Today, the Beacon Society focuses on three goals:

- 1. **Give** Strengthen the Endowment Fund through current gifts and estate bequests. The Fund is vital, as its earnings support the church's annual budget.
- 2. **Educate** Partner with Bryn Mawr Trust to help members understand the most effective ways to contribute through gifts and estate planning.
- 3. **Celebrate** Recognize and honor Beacon Society members with an annual update gathering.
