

Parking Process

The church does not own the Market Square Garage but we pay for worship service parking. You will receive the first of two exit tickets when you press the button to enter the garage. Please do not misplace that first ticket; if you do, the garage will charge you a \$32 lost ticket fee which is your responsibility to pay. In order to exit the garage at

no cost to you, you must obtain a second ticket with the number 2 written on it. At the exit machine, wait until the gate comes down, then insert the ticket you received when entering the garage, bar code facing up. When the machine



asks for payment, insert the ticket you received from the church, bar code up. If you have any kind of problem, press the telephone icon on the exit gate machine and tell the call center rep that you are at the Market Square Garage and your validated exit ticket is not working. Children's Ministry

Children of all ages are always welcome! There are two shelves in our Narthex (at the back of the Sanctuary) with sequin boards, crayons, markers, coloring sheets, and puzzles as well as a few library books that go along with the theme of the worship service. On typical Sundays immediately following the children's sermon (around 11:15 a.m.), education for children K-6 is offered in the Children's Education Room (Level 4). On Sundays, nursery care is available for children (infants through 5-year-olds) in the nursery on the fourth floor. The nursery is staffed by Sidney Dame, our nursery caregiver, and volunteers.

Visitors

We are glad you joined us for worship today! Please take a moment to sign the yellow visitor card located in your pew and place it in the offering plate or hand to an usher. 

Music Notes This Week

Johann Sebastian Bach's beloved chorale prelude, "Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme" ("Sleepers, Wake!") comes from his Schübler Chorales, a set of organ works published near the end of his life. This piece is Bach's organ transcription of the fourth movement of his Cantata 140, making it one of his few works he personally adapted from a cantata for organ. The chorale tune – by the 16th-century hymnwriter Philipp Nicolai – proclaims the Advent call to watchfulness and hope as Christ, the Bridegroom, comes to his people. In Bach's setting, the stately melody sings clearly in the pedal, while flowing accompaniment surrounds it with joyful anticipation.

Our processional hymn, "Lo, He Comes with Clouds Descending" is, in my humble opinion, one of the greatest Advent hymns of the church. First published in the 18th century and most often associated with Charles Wesley, the text draws from Revelation and the Gospels, painting a vivid picture of Christ's final victory and the world's joyful recognition of God's reign. Its dramatic imagery calls the church to hope, awe, and longing for the fulfillment of God's promises. Though the hymn looks toward Christ's second coming, it has long held an important place in the Advent season. Singing this hymn in Advent reminds us that God's work is both past and future: the Child of Bethlehem is also the Lord who will bring all creation to its completion. Paired with the majestic tune Helmsley – an English melody from the 1700s – the hymn gains a sense of grandeur and solemn anticipation.

The Sanctuary Choir will sing the treasured African-American spiritual, "My Lord, What a Morning" arranged by Robert Hobby as our anthem. Drawing on biblical images of the "stars falling' and the trumpet sounding at the coming of the Lord, the song expresses both awe and reassurance. For the singers who first carried this spiritual, these images spoke not only of the final triumph of God but also of the longing for freedom, justice, and a world made new. Robert Hobby's arrangement honors the spiritual's simplicity while adding rich harmonic color and gentle rhythmic motion. In the context of worship, this spiritual invites us to hold together hope and humility as we look toward God's future. Its roots in faith preserving through suffering remind us that Christ's coming brings light to all who wait for deliverance, and its serene melody encourages us to listen for the quiet, steady promise of God's dawn.

Marty Haugen's hymn, "For You, O Lord, My Soul in Stillness Waits" is a modern classic of Advent worship. Inspired by the ancient "O Antiphons" – the traditional prayers sung in the final days before Chrsitmas – the hymn weaves together themes of longing, hope, and quiet trust. Each stanza calls upon Christ with a different biblical title – Wisdom, Lord of Light, Root of Life, Emmauel – echoing centuries of Christian prayer and expectation.

Our offertory anthem was composed by Alan Hovhaness, an American composer of the 20th century. His was known for music that is deeply spiritual, modal, and richly influenced by Eastern and ancient musical traditions. His setting of "Watchman, Tell Us of the Night" brings new musical depth to this 19th-century hymn text by John Bowring, which is rooted in Isaiah's prophetic dialogue between a watchman and a traveler seeking signs of God's coming down. Hovhaness's arrangement reflects the hymn's atmosphere of quiet yearning and mysterious expectation. Using his characteristic transparent textures, flowing lines, and gentle dissonances, he paints the text as unfolding conversation: the traveler's searching questions and the watchman's steady, hope-filled responses.

"Sleepers, Wake!' A Voice Astounds Us" is a well-known Advent hymn written in 1599 by the Lutheran pastor Philipp Nicolai during a time of plague and hardship. The hymn expresses profound hope in Christ's coming. Its central image – the midnight cry of the watchmen – draws from Jesus' parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids (Matthew 25), calling believers to spiritual readiness, watchfulness, and joyful expectation.

The closing voluntary is another setting on "Wachet auf" composed by Emma Lou Diemer, one of America's most versatile and respected composers. I think her setting of this tune offers a fresh and imaginative interpretation. Rather than presenting the melody in a traditional Baroque style, Diemer treats the tune with her characteristic clarity, rhythmic vitality, and full harmonic color. Fragments of the chorale appear in shifting textures, unexpected registrations, and gentle dissonances that create a sense of movement and anticipation.

Music Next Week — The Sanctuary Choir will sing, "A Voice Cries Out, Prepare the Way of the Lord" by Lloyd Larson and "There Is No Rose" by Margaret Burk. The hymns for the morning will be, "Prepare the Way, O Zion," "Isaiah the Prophet Has Written of Old," and "Comfort, Comfort Now My People."

With a paraphrase of Psalm 62:5 as a refrain, this Advent text adapts four of the "Great O" antiphons (all of which can be seen in no. 88), combining them with a paraphrase of Psalm 95:6–7 and an echo of a medieval hymn. This rich blend yields a wealth of imagery and meaning.
